Which of the following literacy practices are most effective in improving reading skills for early readers?

- 1. Exposing all students to complex texts, not only "just right" reading levels.
- 2. Building general content knowledge through science and social studies topics
- 3. Having strong phonics instruction.
- 4. Having a high-quality curriculum based on state standards and newsearch.

NOT listed as an option: Access to books, libraries, librarians. And those presented are wrong or incomplete:

- 1. Harder does not necessarily mean better (Alfie Kohn). We acquire through understanding what we read. And those who read more read more complex texts as their interests develop.
- 2. Those who read more for pleasure know more science, social studies, history.
- 3. At best, a weak phonics program, just the basics.
- 4. "High quality curriculum" and state standards usually don't go together.

Have these people read ANY of the research in the last few decades on the power of self-selected reading and the limits of phonics?
